

Preface

This publication is a cumulation of official Library of Congress additions and changes, 1974-1975, to the classification schedule described on the foregoing title page. It is one of a series of cumulated supplements prepared by the Gale Research Company which, together, cover all schedules, A-Z.

Material for these Gale supplements was cumulated from the quarterly issues of L.C. Classification—Additions and Changes published for 1974 and 1975.

Included in these supplements are additions, eliminations, and changes of classification numbers and the subject terminology covered by these numbers. New matter for the indexes and supplemental tables to the individual schedules is also fully represented.

The style used by L.C. to denote revisions has varied since publication of Additions and Changes began. The more recent tendency has been to use symbols (basically, the two explained below) rather than more detailed explanatory notes. This was done to facilitate possible computerization of the reporting of revisions. The Gale publication has combined the various styles, always attempting to retain the method that would be clearest to the user.

To determine the proper classification number, the cataloger is advised to refer to Gale's Cumulation of Additions and Changes Through 1973 and its supplement, A Cumulation of Additions and Changes, 1974-1975, in conjunction with the Library of Congress's basic schedules.

New editions of schedules C (Auxiliary Sciences of History, 3d ed., 1975), U (Military Science, 4th ed., 1974), and V (Naval Science, 3d ed., 1974) were recently published. With these new editions the cataloger need use only Gale's latest two-year cumulation.

Several professional librarians have worked on this cumulation at Gale's offices in Detroit, and Gale has the final responsibility for the quality of the cumulation. Although there has been no official connection between Gale and the Library of Congress in preparation of this publication, L.C. has generously cooperated in explaining its editorial methods and in answering questions when problems of interpretation arose.

A continuing cumulation service is planned. Please write to Gale for details.

Arrangement and Format Practices Followed in This Cumulation

Revisions are treated as units, and a line is skipped between each unit. A unit may consist of only one line or of several pages when the continuity in relationship is unbroken. Indention of the revision is established by an "anchor point," a line which can be identified in the text of the basic schedule to which other lines of additions or changes are properly related. Frequently it is necessary to repeat lines exactly as they appear in the basic text, and these are enclosed in brackets. An asterisk before an entry indicates that there is a change in number, wording, or indention (or a combination thereof) from that which appears in the original schedule.
